Cutting Back on Food Waste:

Plan your holiday meals in advance to reduce food waste. Industry research shows that about 55 percent of purchases we make in the grocery store are unplanned. You don't have to put a great deal of time and effort into planning:

- Have a few meals in mind for what you're going to cook
- When you get to the checkout, look in your cart and make sure you're going to eat everything. It's so easy to impulse buy!

After dinner, make it easy for your guests to compost and recycle. One of our dedicated Foodcyclers shared their strategy:

"We place the opened, cleaned (kitchen compost) container in the sink and guest willingly scrape their plate into the container."

Some other ideas:

- Use plates, glasses and cutlery that can be washed and re-used.
- After holiday festivities, save leftovers in reusable containers, and share them with your family and friends.
- As always, remember that any food scraps, foodsoiled paper and expired leftovers go into your curbside compost cart.

Fun Fact:

In the early 1900s, President Theodore Roosevelt banned a Christmas tree from the White House because it went against his conservation efforts. At the time, most people harvested their trees from nearby forests. Today, about 98 percent of trees in the U.S. are grown on farms and harvested for sale during the holiday season and Washington state is one of the top tree producers in the country.

Not So Fun Fact:

They are farmed as agricultural products, meaning repeated applications of pesticides, herbicides and fertilizers may be used throughout their lifetime.

Good News:

About 93 percent of trees sold in the U.S. are recycled or composted! Waste Management will pick up your Christmas tree during a special collection the first two weeks of January. They must be unflocked, undecorated, natural, and cut into sections under 4 feet.

- Tear pages from a colorful magazine or use your children's artwork to wrap gifts. This type of paper can be recycled after the celebrations.
- If you do use wrapping paper, look for the kind that is made from recycled paper. Remember to separate out any ribbons and plastic packaging before you recycle it! Also, any wrapping paper that looks like foil or glitter is not recyclable.
