

# Recycling



Paper, flattened cardboard, metal, plastic bottles, round containers (6 oz or larger), rigid nursery pots (4" or larger), all empty and dry

**✗** No plastic bags or wrap, lids, glass, coffee cups, garbage, to-go containers



## Reminders

- Set out carts and bins at the curb by 6 a.m.
- Place at least three feet from cars, trees, mailboxes and other carts and bins, and at least six feet from basketball hoops.
- Do not block sidewalks, bike paths or driveways.

# Glass



Bottles & jars only, empty & dry

**✗** No lids, lightbulbs, caps, ceramics, broken glass of any kind



# Batteries



Tape ends of all household batteries except alkaline. Use clear tape. Put batteries in 1-quart zip-seal bag in glass bin on top of glass.

**✗** No lead acid batteries, vape pens, items with embedded batteries or batteries that do not fit in 1-quart bag



# Food & Yard Waste



All food, coffee filters and plants. Branches under 4" thick and 36" long. This service is not available in rural Washington County or Banks.

**✗** No garbage, pet waste, liquids, dirt to-go containers, lumber, rocks



# Motor oil



Place next to bins in a leak-proof, clear plastic jug with a screw-top lid. Same schedule as glass collection.

# Garbage



All garbage, plastic bags, frozen food boxes, packaging with bubble wrap, to-go containers, cups, lids, straws and cutlery (paper, plastic and "compostable")

**✗** No TVs, computers, batteries, hazardous waste (flammables, paint, pesticides), syringes or medical sharps

Repurpose your things.




Choose to buy used items.

**1** Freeze food before it goes bad.




**2** Eat the oldest food from your fridge first.
